### Koo Wee Rup Township Committee Meeting continued from front page

The Township Committee will host Australia Day awards again next year. Schools have been contacted for nominations. With the closure of the local branch of the CWA, the Lions have agreed to run the kitchen as well as cooking the breakfast. Cr Kaye Cameron gave a brief report regarding budget discussions and the mayoral election.

Lachie has reported the state of Fechner Rd (again) and is awaiting action. Council have told him that the road is within the boundaries of acceptability. There was some discussion about the state of unsealed roads in general and questions were raised about the unacceptability of 'acceptable' standards set by council.

Another NDIS support shop has opened in KWR.

A tender for the redevelopment of the Bowls Club has been accepted and is due to start before the end of this year with completion scheduled for the end of 2024

A bottle recycling station has been installed near the traffic lights.

Garry gave a report on the Bandicoot Habitat Planting Day at the regional health service.

The Forget Me Not café was again very successful, with guests from Monash Health talking about Care plans. A Café was run at Bunjil Place and another at Tooradin, with Casey Council support.

Gus spoke about lighting for the clocktower which was promised some time ago. The original designer of the system has left council, but Gus is hopeful they installed before the end of the year.

The Christmas Light Competition was unanimously approved to run again this year with the prize again being a \$300 Woolies gift card.


### Letter to the Editor





a second prize. This was won by Melissa and Aurora.



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

### Some odd tales from the 1990s (Part 2)

There is an amusing story to tell you about a visit to the WA LPG and LNG Gas Extraction Plant in Kwinana, that I must relate to you. This plant is huge and takes Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG) from the main pipeline and converts it into Liquefied Petroleum Gas (LPG). It is a very large plant and, at that time, converted about 150,000 tonnes of LNG to LPG a year (I also know that in 2016, it was 300,000 tonnes a year). The centrepiece of the plant is three, huge, very tall circular storage tanks with a semi spiral ladder coiling partly around the circumference of the tank to allow you to climb onto the roof. I had to climb up one of them with the site engineer, to look at an old pressure relief valve soon to be replaced with a new one from our Company. Again, no safety

rules like there are now and I ascended this helical stairway in my pressed navy-blue suit wearing a white shirt with a company tie; at least I did wear a hard hat! The job was done, and we descended the stairway to find several security men and the police, complete with divvy van and a sedan with flashing blue lights, staring at my black brief case that was sitting at the bottom of the stairway. I had left it there as I didn't want to carry this quite heavy case to the top and back again. Someone had seen it and thought it might have been a planted terrorist bomb or something, so they called the police. The cops were on the brink of calling for a motorised robot to take it away and blow it up – yes, my briefcase. Fortunately for me, after a frantic explanation, they eventually saw the funny side to this story that I tell you.

We were now seriously planning for our move back to Melbourne and with our time limits and my starting date of April 1994, things seemed to be rushing along at quite a pace. We had to pack up sell the house and get rid some of our worn furniture all in a couple of months it seemed. As it happened, we first chose the wrong real estate agent to sell for us which delayed things a lot. We realised that I would be back in Melbourne working, before any deal could be finalised and so it was left to my dear Olive to oversee the sale of the Perth house and look after all the financial deals and offers. Thinking of those early days of 1994, it is incredible to think that amongst all these moving arrangements I went away for a long weekend of Scuba diving around the Abrolhos Islands. I was now a master-diver and I think that then I just wanted to dive these famous pristine waters; I would never get another chance. The Houtman Abrolhos (often informally called the Abrolhos Islands) is a chain of 122 islands and associated coral reefs, in the Indian Ocean off the west coast of Australia. It lies about eighty kilometres west of Geraldton and is the southernmost true coral reef in the Indian Ocean, and one of

the highest latitude reef systems in the world. It is also one of the world's most important seabird breeding sites, and is the centre of Western Australia's largest single-species fishery, the western rock lobster fishery. It has a small seasonal population of fishermen, and a limited number of tourists are permitted for day trips, but most of the land area is off limits as a conservation habitat. It is well known as the site of numerous shipwrecks, the most famous being the Dutch ships Batavia, which was wrecked in 1629, and Zeewijk, wrecked in 1727. The Batavia was a ship of the Dutch East India Company. It was built in Amsterdam in 1628, and armed with 24 cast-iron cannons and a number of bronze guns. *Batavia* was shipwrecked on her maiden voyage, and was made famous by the subsequent mutiny and massacre that took place among the survivors. A twentieth-century replica of



the ship is also called the Batavia and can be visited in Lelystad, Netherlands.

Our dive club's plan was to go to the Abrolhos Islands via a live-aboard dive boat from Geraldton and explore the reefs. We left Geraldton on a Friday evening in late March 1994 with about eight to ten divers from the club aboard; I can't remember how many exactly. There were three or four crew and they looked after us as if we were millionaire tourists, it was just super. My dive-buddy was Jenny, a pharmacist about 40 odd years old who, I think, didn't like me very much especially when she found out how old I was! Whilst we were diving, Jenny was very proficient and a good buddy. We did four dives over the weekend, but I had to miss out on a night (evening) dive because Jenny declined – I can't recall now if she had a night-dive licence or not.



One of the dives was off Stokes Island. The island is named after John Lort Stokes, commander of the ship Beagle and friend and companion of Charles Darwin – no relation to me, his grandfather, John Rees, took on the Stokes surname and became John Rees Stokes because he liked it; Stokes was the surname of his wife's brother – yes, really. John entered the navy in the *Prince Regent* in 1824 and was soon transferred to the brig *Beagle*, in which he served for eighteen years, becoming midshipman in 1825, mate and assistant surveyor in 1831, lieutenant in 1837 and commander in 1841. From 1860 to 1863 Stokes commanded the ship *HMS Rose* surveying the coasts of the *English Channel*. He retired in 1863, was promoted to the rank of rear admiral in 1863, vice-admiral in 1871 and admiral in 1877. He died at his home in Scotchwell, Haverfordwest, South Wales on the 11th June 1885. It was written that *"Stokes was an enterprising and efficient officer; he was a man of genial personality, with considerable ability as a vivacious writer"*.

Here is an extract of what I wrote in my log of the dive off Stokes Island.

13:03: 94. Stokes Island, Abrolhos Isles.

Depth of dive 16.7m. Visibility 10m. Time in 09:53. Time out 10:30. Dive time 37min.


A beautiful dive over staghorn coral that had blue tips. Some plate coral too. Lots of coral fish, too many to list. Just magnificent but we did see a few Steep Head Parrot fish, Coral Trout and two beautiful Clarkes' anemonefish. Buoyancy still OK at 10 kg. Will try for more reduction. Temp. 28 deg C. Water temp 21 deg C, great.

The meals aboard with drinks and the accommodation aboard were first class and this super diving weekend made a wonderful finale to my diving days in WA. You may note the date of this final WA dive, March 1994.but, before I close this phase of my life 1988–1994, below is a look at my scuba diving qualifications that I gained at what some people may say was rather late in life! My last dive ever was at Malua Bay NSW, on the 1st of February 1999; I was 67 years old! My deepest dive of 39.5m on just compressed air, was on the 15th of May 1993, south of Parkes Point, W.A.

It was time to take up my new job in Melbourne and my dear Olive saw me off at the airport and I took with me my empty divers air cylinder, BCD (buoyancy vest), and all the other diving gear, so that I could perhaps get a dive over the coming weeks of, hopefully, a good weather period in Melbourne before settling into a new house. The plan was for me to stay with our son and his wife at their house in Kensington whilst I looked for a new home for Olive and me, somewhere reasonably close to them and our daughter Catherine. The thought of being closer to both instead of 3,000km away was the main reason for Olive and me deciding to return to Melbourne; together of course with the new job offer. As soon as we had a buyer for the house it was planned that I would return to Perth to help and then, when the sale was finalised, we would then drive back to Melbourne across the Nullarbor in the Nissan Turbo.

And so once more it was up, up and away - Perth to Melbourne - and it was very sad indeed temporary leaving my dearest Olly, but we both knew it was once again the start of another exciting phase of our life together.

Here are my diving qualifications. Those were very excitng days into a magical unknown underwater world, full of nature's treasures, magical shipwrecks and myriads of beautiful and different shaped and sized fish.

### **News from the Community Advisory Committee**

The Community Advisory Committee (CAC) met on the 21st of November for their third meeting of the current year. Their guest speaker was Marlene Dalziel who is a local active member of the Southeastern Melbourne Primary Health Network Aged Care Reference Group. The purpose of this reference group is to provide feedback and advice to the Clinical and Community Council (CCC) Board and management on matters relating to planning, implementation, and ongoing evaluation of Primary and Aged Care. Marlene talked about her involvement and the role of the Primary Aged Care Reference Group (PACRG) that includes:

- 1. Advising, supporting, and providing guidance on matters referring to planning, implementation, and the ongoing evaluation of planned or current primary and Aged Care programs.
- 2. Consider the overlap of mental health and aging issues across programs and population groups as appropriate.
- 3. Consider how the recommendations of the Royal Commission into Aged Care can be incorporated into solutions for current and future programs.
- 4. Consider the role of technical innovations in the provision of care in the community.
- 5. Share consumer, carer, and service provider and community views from across the region.
- 6. Communicate any emerging risks or opportunities identified.

The CCC has oversight responsibility of outcomes from the PACRG, with notes, action items and a report provided to the CCC after each PACRG meeting. Feedback from the CCC will be provided to the PACRG as appropriate. Marlene received many thanks for her enlightening and important contributions to the above councils and for her talk today.

Other items that were discussed at the meeting were 'Partnering in Healthcare, the Koo-Wee-Rup Regional Health Services (KRHS) Strategic Plan – engaging deeply with our community, and Aileen Thoms talked about the 'Gathering of Kindness' program where kindness to others across the whole range of hospital treatments was so important for the ongoing health of all patients. In fact, the guest speaker at the 2023 Annual general meeting of the KRHS which is an open access Board meeting-open to the public- is Professor Catherine Crock AM, Physician and Founder of the Hush Foundation

and Gathering of Kindness. The final item was a discussion on the KRHS Quality, Safety and Clinical Governance report led by The CEO Noni Burke.

Now, to our friends and neighbours in Koo-Wee-Rup and District remember any of our members will be available to help you if you want to communicate with the Koo-Wee-Rup Regional Health Service Board of Management about problems that could be upsetting you, as a patient, a resident or a carer, and also, maybe, as an individual Koo-Wee-Rup resident or, indeed, from the whole community's point of view. Any Community Advisory Committee member will listen to you closely and acknowledge your concerns, so that any problem you may have is understood and seriously considered. We are your advocates always.




### **Koo Wee Rup Bowls Club**



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



### An Acrostic History of Koo Wee Rup

This is an eclectic look at some themes from Koo Wee Rup's history and the first letter of each theme spells a seasonal greeting.

**M** is for Mickle. A well known, early family in the area. John Mickle (1814-1885) owned land from the 1850s, with his business partners William Lyall (who built *Harewood*) and John Bakewell. John's brother Alexander Mickle managed his property at Yallock. Alexander's son, John, sub-divided John Street, Mickle Street and Alexander Avenue (now incorrectly called Alexandra) in Koo Wee Rup in 1926. David Mickle, the author of local history books *Mickle Memories of Koo Wee Rup*, is the grandson of Alexander.

E is for Education. The first School was established in 1884 between Koo Wee Rup and Bayles (at Bethunes Road). It was known as the Yallock School until 1903 when the name was changed to Koo Wee Rup. In 1910, the school moved to Rossiter Road (to the Secondary College location) and a new building was built in 1915. In 1953, the Higher Elementary School was completed. This School included both primary and secondary classes (Forms 1 to 3 or Years 7 to 9). The School became a High School in 1957 and shared the building with the primary school students until November 1960 when the Primary School opened in Moody Street. St John the Baptist Catholic School opened in 1936.

**R** is for roads, rates and rubbish - the historical purpose of local councils. Koo Wee Rup was part of the Cranbourne Road Board district when it was established on June 19, 1860. Then it became part of the Cranbourne Shire when it started on February 24, 1868. It was then part of the short lived City of Cranbourne which lasted from April 22, 1994 until December 15, 1994, when the City of Cranbourne and was broken up and Koo Wee Rup became part of the newly created Cardinia Shire.

**R** is for Recreation and other Community activities. A Cricket Club started in 1893, the Recreation Reserve opened in 1906, and a football team had started by 1907. The Royal Hotel was erected in 1915. The Masonic Lodge commenced in 1923. The Wattle Picture Theatre was opened in 1927, the same year the Koo Wee Rup Electric Light and Power Company supplied electricity to the town. In 1929, the first Koo Wee Rup Scout Troop was formed. To add further to the amenity of the town in 1930 the water tower and the water supply system opened and in 1943 the Fire Brigade was formed.

Y is for Yallock. The first European settlement in the area was established by Samuel Rawson and Robert Jamieson on the Yallock Creek in 1839. The Yallock Village Settlement, established in the 1890s, was based around Fincks, School, Hall and O'Briens Roads, off Koo Wee Rup Longwarry Road. The Bayles Railway Station, which opened in 1922, was the station closest to Yallock and the township which grew around the railway station soon overshadowed the original Yallock settlement.

**C** is for Carlo Catani. Catani (1852-1918) was a Public Works Department Engineer responsible for the drainage works on the Koo Wee Rup Swamp from 1893. He also established the Village Settlements at Yallock, Five Mile, Cora Lynn, Iona etc. The town of Catani is named after him. His other works in Victoria include the creation of Alexandra Avenue, which runs along the Yarra River, and the design of the Alexandra Gardens; the reclamation of the St Kilda foreshore and the design of the gardens there, which were named in his honour in 1927; engineering the road to the top of Mount Buffalo and the creation of a recreational lake, Lake Catani; the drainage of the Moe Swamp.

**H** is for Historical Society. The Koo Wee Rup Swamp Historical Society was established in 1974, so we are celebrating 50 years in 2024. We operate a Museum at *Mallow*, 325 Rossiter Road, Koo Wee Rup. *Mallow* was built by John Colvin for his daughter, Margaret, who married Les O'Riordan in August 1918. Les was born in August 1892 to John and Elizabeth (nee O'Callaghan) O'Riordan and is said to have been the first white child born in the Koo Wee Rup Village settlement.

Elizabeth had been born in the town of Mallow, County Cork, Ireland, hence the name of the property.

R is for Religion. In 1896 the Wesleyan Church from Cranbourne was moved to Koo Wee Rup and became the Presbyterian Church. The first Catholic Church was built in 1902 and the current church dates from 1962. The Anglican Church was built in 1917 and closed in 2012 and the congregation moved to the Uniting Church. The Methodist Church (now Uniting) was moved from Yallock to Rossiter Road in 1932. In 1978 this building was moved to a camp in Grantville and a wooden church, the Narre Warren East Uniting Church, was relocated to the site, it was given a brick veneer and a new hall added and opened on February, 3 1980.

I is for Inundation. Early pioneers had to cope with numerous inundations or floods - 1901, 1911,1916, 1923, 1924, 1934,

1935 and 1937 being some of the worst historically. The 1934 flood resulted in the Koo Wee Rup township being under two meters of water in places.

S is for Swamp. The Koo Wee Rup Swamp originally covered about 40,000 hectares or 96,000 acres and is part of the Western Port sunkland. The Chief Engineer of the Public Works Department, William Thwaites (1853 - 1907) surveyed the Swamp in 1887 and his report recommended the construction of the Bunyip Main Drain from where it entered the Swamp, in the north, to Western Port Bay and a number of smaller side drains. A tender was advertised in 1889. In spite of strikes, floods and bad weather by March 1893, the private contractors had constructed the 16 miles of the drain from the Bay to the south of Bunyip and the Public Works Department considered the Swamp was now dry enough for settlement. At one time over 500 men were employed and all the work was done by hand, using axes, shovels, mattocks and wheel barrows. By 1904, over 2,000 people including 1,400 children lived on the Swamp. Many more drains have been added over the years.



T is for Trains. The Koo Wee Rup Railway station was opened on August 18, 1889. The Station was originally called Yallock

and was re-named Koo Wee Rup in 1892. In 1922, Koo Wee Rup became a railway junction with the opening of the Strzelecki railway line. This was a boom time for the Station. In 1926 eleven people were employed at the Koo Wee Rup Station and they dispatched 50,000 tons of goods and around 7,000 head of livestock were sent or received there. There were 48 passenger trains and 72 goods trains per week. The Strzelecki line was closed in stages and the last stretch from Bayles to Koo Wee Rup closed in 1959. Passenger services to Koo Wee Rup ceased in June 1981; were reinstated December 1984 and ceased again in July 1993.

**M** is for Medical Matters. A Bush Nursing Centre was opened in 1918. In 1923 the Fallen Soldiers' Memorial Hospital opened in Station Street and moved to a new building, the Westernport Memorial Hospital, in

Rossiter Road in 1955. In 1946, the Infant Welfare Centre was opened in a room at the Memorial Hall and in 1953 the Pre-School opened.

A is for Agriculture. By the 1920s, the Koo Wee Rup Swamp was producing one quarter of Victorian potatoes and was also a major producer of dairy products. Today, more than 90% of all Australian asparagus is produced on the Koo Wee Rup Swamp and many other food items are grown including broccolini, strawberries, cabbage, leeks, celery and lettuces. If the Government can resist the temptation to rezone all the rich agricultural swamp land to residential then the Swamp should continue to produce food for at least another 120+ years.

**S** is for Shopping. The first shop was opened by John O'Riordan in 1890 in a tin shed where Light's Garage is now located. Many of the shops in Rossiter Road were built in the 1920s and 1930s, as was the old Theatre and a few garages. This was a boom time for the town with the Hospital, State Rivers & Water Supply Commission, surrounding farms and the railways all providing a steady source of employment. 


