Another story about my working days - Part 2 by Geoff Stokes


Continued from May edition

Back at work on the Monday in Noble Park I had to front up to my direct managers and tell them I was leaving the Company. The news didn't go down very well at all and their lectures to me very nearly made me change my mind, but they couldn't match my new salary and a quite surreal expenses package. They suggested that I leave that very evening so I had to pack up what I could, leave the company car in their workshop, and get a lift home.

It took a while to rent an office, buy furniture, hire a car, and set up the paperwork and soon I was ready to really get going with a Jamesbury presence in Australia. First though, a very strange thing happened. I had been ensconced in my new office in Wellington Parade, East Melbourne, for about two weeks when I received a telex (No fax or mobile phone then in 1982) telling me that Seng, the accountant from Singapore, would be coming over to visit me. The telex said he would assess if I was really suitable for the work and had hired the services of KMRP (I am sure you must have heard of them) a world-wide accountancy firm who specialised in 'Knowledge Management Research & Practice' to interview me, whatever that meant. I couldn't believe it; hadn't we discussed all this in Singapore, it's a bit late now to cancel everything I thought. I was convinced it was all signed up and delivered. Nevertheless, Seng came over and stayed at the Southern Cross Hotel, a five-star establishment in the city but now no longer there. The meeting was held around a huge circular table in the KMRP office atop of Nauru tower-house and there were three people from KMRP, me, and Seng. Seng immediately took over the meeting, much to the chagrin of the other three KMRP people. He started off by placing a tape recorder in the middle of the desk and spouted forth about what he expected of everyone. I could see that the KMRP people were extremely embarrassed, and it was not long before the meeting fizzled out with one of the guys saying to me

as an aside, "Don't worry we have more worries about Mr. Seng than we have about you". Seng stayed on for another two days and I had to take him around to see all the local tourist sites etc. He was a pain in the bum, he really was. I met him one morning for breakfast at his hotel – five stars remember – and he ordered a boiled egg, "Just coddled", he told the waiter. Well, in total the waiter brought in five eggs until there was one sufficiently undercooked that satisfied Seng; all the other eggs were rejected by him and sent back to the kitchen with increasing ire by the extremely patient waiter. It was a very embarrassing experience for me. Below is an example of their strange ways. I sent in a bill I had paid a Company for printing. Read it and you will see the way Seng's accounts people thought!

You can just imagine me trying to access Federal Government gazetted enactments and laws in precomputer or pre-mobile phone days. As soon as I started to search the relevant clauses and associated regulations, I realised what a waste of time this was, it was so difficult I just ignored their request. In Singapore a red mark went alongside my name! As I said, this was one of many such-like requests from



Singapore head office and all were somewhat foreign to the usual Australian way of conducting an engineering supply business.

After several appointments with my regular customers in Melbourne to whom I explained that I was now representing Jamesbury, the call came for me to visit the Jamesbury Corp's head office in Worcester, Massachusetts. At last I thought, I will now be visiting the Mecca of valve manufacturing, something I have always wished to do. It was the beginning of December before I flew over to the USA and this time it was a long flight; Melbourne to Boston via Los Angeles then by road to Worcester. It was planned that I stay there for three weeks. In other words, it would be almost Christmas before I was home again. It's pointless going into too much detail but there were about seven or eight USA distributors who were at Jamesbury Corp for product training and there was me, the only Jamesbury employee on the course. That being so I was lodged at a much lower star rated hotel than all the others who all met for breakfast every day and boozed together every night.

I joined them a couple of times I think, but most of the time I was a lone operator as before. I did catch up with Bill P, my old mentor who was now chief Engineer, and he and his dear wife Dorothy made a fuss of me a couple or so days of the two weekends I was there. I recall she cooked steak and kidney pudding one night and it was with real suet. It was very nice indeed. The other weekend I was invited to their neighbour's home to join them all in an American style Christmas Day lunch. The neighbour would be away on the official day. I also visited a facility in Boston and took the opportunity of visiting the old battleship of the early 1800s, The USS Constitution - Old Ironsides. In the War of 1812, the Constitution won battles with the British frigates Guerriere and Java; the former battle took place about 1,200 km (750 mi) north of Boston on Aug. 19, 1812, and the latter off the coast of Brazil on Dec. 29, 1812. The Constitution made its last combat tour in 1814-15. The ship was scheduled to be scrapped in 1830, but Oliver Wendell Holmes's poem "Old Ironsides" inspired a public movement to save it. Restored in 1925, the Constitution is now the oldest commissioned vessel in the US Navy. Moored in Boston it is presently serving as a museum ship at the Charleston Navy Yard, Boston, MA. The product training went well, and it was interspersed with tests and exams along the way. All done with great aplomb to make you feel and know that Jamesbury is the best and finest valve manufacturer in the world; I came away raring to go. The weather was cold and one morning the temperature dropped to minus 26 Deg. F (minus 32 Deg. C); thankfully it was also dry and crisp. That morning I went outside and walked somewhere through the icy slush in by best Aussie shoes and the soles fell off. Bill and Dorothy were members of a choir and just before I returned home the choir headed up a carol and Christmas fare evening. One of the items they sang was the Hallelujah Chorus from 'The Messiah' and way back in the audience I joined in with them with gusto! Soon it was time to come home again, and I planned it so that I could stop off in Los Angeles for a couple of days to see my old friends Stan and Sue and Mo and Jim Zinger. We

had а great weekend together and I remember very well being taken а ride for (literally) in Jim's hot rod car. What the make was I have no idea, but it was fitted with a very powerful V8 engine, and the car stood up its back wheels when Jim stood on the accelerator. A short business stopover New Zealand on the way home and I was soon back in Olive's welcoming arms again and

Everything appeared fine on the surface, orders were coming in to everyone's satisfaction, and after a few weeks I appointed a well-known West Australian company as our distributor for Australia. Business gradually built up and all was very satisfying to me. During this early time several visitors from Jamesbury USA arrived for their obligatory tour of our more important customers. I invited one of them, the Jamesbury USA Sales Manager, to our home in Smiths Gully for dinner as a bit of change from his motel and hotel touring life. I recall he was most amused by the word 'Gully' because in the USA a gully, he said, is a drain! We all got on very well and I am sure he was impressed by the work that we were all doing for Jamesbury in Australia and New Zealand. I think I have forgotten to mention that I was still travelling to New Zealand and I had taken on the same agents who were the +GF+ distributer in NZ, so there was no clash of loyalties. The Company was Taylors Engineering Ltd, Taylors were doing well with Jamesbury, mostly in the paper industry but the petroleum refinery and associated sites were also quickly coming on board. Our clients were always interested to hear about Jamesbury's speciality valves, i.e. large valves for cryogenic services and valves for the space exploration industry, especially the valves for aiding blast off. Talking to clients about these unusual services always gave us an opening to show off our everyday general industrial ball valves.

It was late in the morning of Monday the 9th of April 1984; a pleasant day weather-wise as I recall. I was sitting in my office at 64 Wellington Parade doing the usual paperwork for Singapore when the phone rang. It was Tony, the WA Valves representative in Victoria and of course a friend from my earlier working days. He was very agitated and said that he had just left a meeting in Melbourne at the Melbourne Hilton Hotel with Don Jones (the CEO of WA Valves) and Ed Wong and both of them were on their way to my office to sack me! They had decided that there was now no need for any one person to directly represent Jamesbury Corp in Australia, WA Valves could do all that. I was now a nonentity. I thanked



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Tony for his information and fidelity and prepared for the inevitable. It was after lunch when Ed Wong arrived; presumably nothing could stop him enjoying a mid-day repast at the Melbourne Hilton, just down the road from my office, before he started on his dastardly act. Accompanying him was an (I say 'an' because Jamesbury had several) International sales manager, a fellow I knew ever so slightly from my visit to Jamesbury USA a couple of years or so ago. The first thing Ed Wong said, before any explanation of his surprise visit was to ask me to hand over my company Diners Club card, I couldn't believe it! Was I going to run off straight away and buy something? He said that, as WA Valves was now clearly operating the market well, there was now no need for me to be doing the same thing. I was not needed any more; my work for Jamesbury was over. Could I please arrange to sell the office furniture and hand over all the paperwork and customer details to Don Jones, cancel my Company car rental with Avis immediately, and take notice of dismissal of a month. He tempered this statement somewhat by saying maybe a month before they would want the car sent back. It was as quick as that and within say about an hour they were gone, and I never saw Wong again and Jones maybe a couple of times over the next three or four years but more of that later. I did try to argue my cause with them, but their minds had been made up a long while and they did not listen to me in any way. Another chapter in my working life had passed and I was now very much on my own and over 50 years old. Not good! However, the world moves on, and I joined it and now entered a new stage of my working life. More later.

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Need a skin check?

Minnie Eason's story recognised

Minnie Eason, whose story was shared in the November 2022 Blackfish, has been honoured in Australia's first statewide women's commemorative tour, called Finding Her. Her granddaughter, and biographer, Karen Collins was incredibly exciting to attend Her Place Museum in East Melbourne, for the launch of this significant project and to be presented with a QR code to attach to the base of Minnie's headstone in Rosedale.

This state-funded project is a result of the scarcity of permanent markers of women, particularly First Nations women and gender diverse women; only 4% of statues in Victoria are of women. There are more statues of animals than of

Shire's Liveability Plan 2017 – 2029, which has 7 long-term goals:


- Improve mental health and wellbeing

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Building sustainable local roads across Cardinia Shire

Cardinia Shire Council is making ground-breaking strides in sustainable road construction practices, using ground penetrating radar (GPR) to survey underground tree roots.

In a world-first collaboration, Cardinia Shire Council partnered with Australian spatial data services provider, Veris to identify underground tree root systems using the latest GPR technology, and mobile laser scanning to capture an unsealed road corridor in 3D.

The GPR technology was first trialled along Dore Road, Nar Nar Goon, as part of environmental investigations under **the Strategic Sealed Roads program**.

These surveys have enabled arborists and council to determine the location and depth of existing tree roots, and which

tree roots will remain viable throughout construction and which trees will need to be removed.

Working in a similar fashion to a submarine signals sending down to the ocean floor, surveyors equipped a car with cameras and radar software. which then travelled along Dore Rd emitting



signals to capture a complete image of what lies below and around the existing path.

Cardinia Shire Council CEO Carol Jeffs is proud to see the progressive initiatives being introduced to help build a better Cardinia.

"We are proud to be introducing new, sustainable practices and initiatives to reduce our environmental impact during roadworks and help conserve our native wildlife and vegetation."

"Previously using arborist surveys alone, would mean that we would need to remove an excessive number of trees and vegetation, as we couldn't see below the surface. Now utilising ground penetrating radar, we can create a map to help us save more trees, habitats, time, and ratepayers money." Carol said.

There are 1000s of trees that line Dore Rd, and arborists estimate that over 340 trees could have potentially been removed as part of sealing upgrade works and using traditional surveying methods. However, thanks to these GPR surveys, 95% of these identified trees along Dore Rd will now be saved.

For the innovative work along Dore Rd, council recently won an Excellence Award for Innovation from Institute of Public Works Engineering Australasia.

The Strategic Sealed Roads Program will deliver 40 kilometres of new, sealed roads across Cardinia Shire. This will reduce environmental impacts associated with unsealed roads including run-off and dust, while improving comfort and service levels for road-users.

Due to the successful results along Dore Rd, council is now rolling out the GPR surveys on other Strategic Sealed Roads projects such as Mt Lyall Road in Heath Hill, Bessie Creek Road in Gembrook, and Evans Rd in Bunyip.

Works to seal the full 6km length of Dore Road, Nar Nar Goon will start from June 2023 and are expected to be completed by December 2023.

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A short history of the Koo Wee Rup Hospitals

The Koo Wee Rup Regional Health Service has just celebrated it centenary and this is a short history of the Hospitals in Koo Wee Rup.

The Bush Nursing Centre opened in July 1918 and a nurse's cottage was built in 1921 and it was on May 23,1923 that the Bush Nursing Hospital, named the Fallen Soldiers' Memorial Hospital, officially opened in Station Street.

The Koo Wee Rup Sun report of the opening noted that much of the credit for the Hospital goes to the long serving Secretary, George Burhop, who joined the committee in 1918. As they reported - Now that the hospital is an accomplished fact, we cannot conclude without saying that one outstanding personality in bringing the scheme to a successful consummation has been the untiring zeal and devotion of Mr G.R. Burhop. He has been absolutely absorbed in the work. The most difficult task did not daunt him, and he has given time, money and labor and he must feel highly elated that the object for which he has been striving is now a practical reality. He has worked in a splendid spirit and has been suffused with "the white heat of a passionate enthusiasm" for the centre.

George Randall Burhop was born in England on October 16, 1873 and died in Brisbane on May 30, 1949; he married Dorothea Pausacker in 1898 (she died 1962, aged 87) and they had four children - Dora, Amey, George and Thomas. George was a Cranbourne Shire Councillor 1921-1941 and Shire President 1927-1928. George arrived in Australia with his parents when he was 13 years old and after living in New South Wales and Queensland took over his parent's farm on McDonald's Drain Road in 1914 and later purchased a large allotment in Lea Road. Mr Burhop was the Secretary of Hospital for 29 years until his retirement in December 1947.

The Hospital was opened by Cr E. Sinclair Hill, who also unveiled a tablet in memory of the local fallen soldiers - Jacob Bambury (listed as Banbury on the plaque), David Bethune, Sydney Blake, John Bryan, Thomas Bryan (both listed as Bryant on the plaque), Michael Callanan, Lawrence Coates, Percy Davis, John Davy, George Garbellini, Henry Hamilton, John Hannaker, Richard Martin, George Osborne, John O'Shea, James Randle, Bernard Slocombe, Arthur Williams and Charles Woods.

One of the results of the Hospital opening was that in May 1923, the first Resident Doctor, Dr Lyell Andrews, arrived in the town. In February 1925, Dr Alan Hewitt and his wife, Vera, who was a trained nurse, took over Dr Andrew's practice. Dr Alan retired from practice in 1963; his son Dr John worked in Koo Wee Rup from 1951 until 1955 and another son, Dr lan, commenced practice in the town in 1955 and retired in 1995, ending 70 years of service from the Hewitt family to the town. I wonder how many babies they delivered in that time?

The Age reported that on October 26, 1929, the hospital accommodation was increased by the addition of an enclosed verandah of the type common to the majority of bush nursing hospitals in Victoria. As it was of liberal dimensions, the verandah has ample room for 10 beds, which means the accommodation of the hospital has been doubled.

Drama struck the hospital in December 1934 when the patients had to be evacuated through the roof as the Hospital was flooded to a depth of 7ft within a few minutes. In October the next year a new operating theatre was opened. The Hospital relied on subscriptions and local donations but the Pakenham Racing Club was also a large donor and every year, in the 1930s to the 1950s, they held a Hospital Race Meeting to raise funds for both the Koo Wee Rup and the Pakenham Bush Nursing Hospitals.

In late 1945, the Westernport Memorial Hospital Provisional Committee was formed for the *purpose of establishing a modern public hospital in the Koo Wee Rup locality* and it *appeals for the support and loyal co-operation of every person residing in the area.* The immediate objective was to raise £5000.

A major problem facing Hospitals after the War in the late 1940s and early 1950s was a shortage of nurses; in fact it was so dire that it was reported that some hospitals, including Koo Wee Rup, would have to close.

One innovative solution to the nursing shortage was this, as *The Herald* reported - *Staff shortages in Victorian hospitals* could be eased if male nurses were accepted generally, several trained male nurses had come from England recently and there had been several Australian ex-servicemen with provisional registrations, but, with the exception of one training school, metropolitan and country hospitals did not appear to be interested in employing them.....There were between 30 and 40 trained male nurses in England willing to migrate. Some were highly qualified. One had a special certificate as a male tutor, and would give the opportunity to establish male nurse training in Victoria.

The Westernport Memorial Hospital Committee continued their fundraising and in 1953 Bates, Smart and McCutcheon were appointed as architects and the Trusteel Corporation was the successful tenderer for the new hospital, in Rossiter Road. The local community had raised £20,000 towards the cost of the building the hospital and the nurses' home, which cost £200,500 and was constructed in seven months.


A short history of the Koo Wee Rup Hospitals (from page 23)

The Koo Wee Rup Sun reported on July 20, 1955 that Matron Laird had been appointed and that the Hospital would be ready for occupation the next month, and would be officially opened on August 22. A Meeting to form a Ladies Auxiliary was held on July 28. The visiting hours for the hospital were set at 10.30am - 11am, 2.30pm - 3.30pm and 7.15pm - 8.15pm and no children under 14, except babes in arms, would be admitted as visitors. August 22 came and went and there was no official opening, however on August 24, 1955 the hospital was opened for business with the patients in the old building transferred by ambulance to the new building. The Hospital Secretary, Mr Pollock, could advertise that the hospital was open to receive patients for all kinds of nursing.

It wasn't until December 4, 1955 that the official opening of the Hospital and Nurses' Home took place. The Koo Wee Rup Sun could report that despite inclement weather conditions there was a large attendance on Sunday afternoon to witness the official opening of the new 23-bed Westernport Memorial Hospital, costing £200,000, excluding furnishings. The ceremony was performed by Dr. H. J. Lindell, chairman of the Hospitals and Charities Commission.

The focus of the Hospital changed from the 1990s - the Killara Hostel opened in 1997, the operating theatre closed in 2004. However what didn't change was the need to raise funds and Hospital Balls were a regular feature and a major fundraiser was the Koo Wee Rup Potato Festival held from 1973 until 2000. However, the jewel of the Crown is the Ladies Auxiliary, formed in July 1955 and still going strong and still raising money for the Health Service. Coming up for their 70th anniversary, a Platinum Jubilee, in two years time. It is an anniversary well worth celebrating for their consistent dedication to their cause and to the town of Koo Wee Rup and surrounds. The Ladies are truly worth their weight in platinum, gold and diamonds.


