Koo Wee Rup Township Committee Meeting

The Township held its AGM and monthly meeting on Wednesday, 2 August at the KWR Community Centre. The next meeting will be held on Wednesday, 6 September at 7:30 pm at the KWR Community Centre. Everyone is welcome to attend Township Meetings and join in the discussion.

At last month's AGM, Caroline Roff, Gavin Brock and Garry Oates were re-elected as President, Secretary and Vice President. Other committee members are Ellen Brown, Frank Crameri, Joyce Light, Lachie McKay, Gus Moore, Geoff Stokes and Trevor Westmore. President's Report to the AGM on page 9.

The committee discussed the issue of potholes in the carpark near the Bayles Hall, and the still missing shelter over the BBQ and table at the eastern end of the Bayles tennis courts. Part of this area is the responsibility of the Department of Transport and part is council land. Councillor Cameron will follow up.

Cr Cameron advised on the following shire matters:

- The Planning Permit for the Community Care Home was issued on 19TH July 2023. This development was not required to be advertised because it is NDIS compliant specialty disability suitable accommodation.
- Council has been discussing accessing future funding from the Federal Government to replace the roads funding that was removed.
- The Building Better Regions fund has also been discontinued.
- There is still funding for the Pakenham revitalisation project to improve Main Street and attract shoppers back to the Pakenham CBD. Garry mentioned that the CAIAC had reviewed the plans. They can be viewed here: https://creating.cardinia.vic.gov.au/pakenham-revitalisation-project. One of the proposals is for Main Street to be one-way.

Some questions for Cr Cameron:

Is there a bike path, code of conduct?

Some paths have signs reminding people to use bells but no code of conduct.

The Biennial meeting for the Koo Wee Rup Community Centre was held last month with president, Gus Moore, re-elected for a third term. Seven new members were welcomed, with a new secretary and hall booking officer appointed, and thanks going to the previous long-standing Secretary, Lisa Van Dord.

Would there be a neighbourhood code of conduct?

Cardinia Shire participates in the Good Neighbour Day every year bur there is no specific code. Building neighbourhoods and community is included in the Shire Liveability Plan.

Garry reported on his first attendance at the Koo Wee Rup and Longwarry Flood Protection District Advisory Committee: The Koo Wee Rup Longwarry Flood Protection District Advisory Committee had a meeting on the 20th July, which commenced at the KWR Community Centre. About 13 attendees, some being MW, Cardinia Shire, Baw Baw Shire, and reps from the community (2 of whom were new to the Committee). 5 apologies (including Casey Council).

After introductions and formalities, a works update was presented.

KWR is unusual as we have all these drains and waterways to stop us flooding. The only other areas in Vic are Geelong and Kinglake that have additional requirements compared to metropolitan.

We pay a special levy on our water rates to help maintain the drainage works serving the district. Called a Precept rate, which is in addition to the Waterways & Drainage charge that all landowners pay across greater metro Melbourne.

There is a team of workers, lots of equipment such as tractors, mowers, excavators required.

There are co-ordination requirements between VicRoads, councils and landowners for access and accountability.

Hence the works schedule. This does not include Reactive emergency Maintenance.

We then headed off for a field trip. Aim to give a better understanding of what is involved.

1st stop Cora Lynn Ford, where we discussed:

- The actual capacity of the drainage system protecting KWR is greater than the design capacity required
- How sediment/ sand is trapped through a diversion at the Ford
- Proposed new flood warning system on the road to replace gates, to be transferred to Cardinia Shire for ongoing management

then to the footy club for lunch that had been organised and brought along by the team.

2nd stop McDonalds Drain-Fechner Rd where we discussed the maintenance, concept and profile of the drains,

3rd stop Gum Scrub Creek-Wenn Rd. Viewed a floodgate and discussed its operation and purpose.

The day started at 10am and finished at 2pm. Was very informative, those that attended were passionate about what was involved, and as a result a great committee to be on.

There were a couple of issues raised regarding the drains and minor flooding around town. Garry and Gavin will contact



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Melbourne Water and arrange an inspection of the drains downstream of the Koo Wee Rup Pakenham Road and the connection of stormwater drains to Southern Boundary Drain at the end of William Street

Ellen thanked Caroline for her wonderful work on producing the Blackfish every month.

Frank has contacted the owner of the old PMP site and he has no objection to the idea of beautifying the area and improving the seating, but has asked that we wait a few months before doing anything.

President's Report to the 2023 Township Committee AGM

I thought this year I would start by outlining the role of Township Committee as I see it. The purpose underlying everything the committee does is to make Koo Wee Rup a better place to live. We advocate to local, state and federal government and other organisations for improvements to the town and on other issues affecting the township. For small things like rubbish removal, footpath improvements, sealing open drains, patching roads, and for larger things like the duplication of the road to Pakenham, which took years of advocacy. We build a sense of community through the production of the Blackfish, through the community awards presented on Australia Day and through our support of other community groups working towards to the same end.

Koo Wee Rup used to be a small country town largely populated by people who had lived here all their lives. Today we are also a dormitory town where young couples and families move to find a nice 3 or 4 bedroom house with a garden in a safe and pleasant community while working out of town. We need to make sure that we keep all relevant demographics in mind when advocating for improvements.

Some notable events of the last year have been:

- Watching the duplication of the Pakenham Road; each new section opened makes it feel that one day we really will
 have a safe and reliable road to Pakenham. The three new roundabouts on the road at the abattoir, Hall Road and
 Ballarto Road have all been completed, as has the widened drain crossing at Ballarto Road. You can now see the
 outline of the road for its full length.
- Two of our local institutions have marked significant milestones. The Hospital celebrated 100 years of service to Koo Wee Rup and the Senior Citizens Club celebrated 50 years (albeit a little delayed because of Covid). Both institutions have lasted in large part because of their willingness to change to meet the needs of a changing community.
- The naming of Ray Brown Walk in honour of the Township Committee's long time President and local Councillor.
- The Historical Society, together with Council, have erected signs on the old railway platform telling the history of rail in Koo Wee Rup.

There are still many projects we'd like to see actioned, including:

- Improvements to the streetscape on Station Street. Creating a screen for the vacant land of the old PMP site until it can be developed.
- Creating a train mural on the back of the Woolworths building to acknowledge local history and to create a feature for the town.'
- Working with council to improve the habitat of the Southern Brown Bandicoot through the Koo Wee Rup area and designating KWR the 'home of the Southern Brown Bandicoot'.
- Once the road to Pakenham is completed, connecting the new bike and walking track that will run from Pakenham to Manks Road to the town's footpath network.
- Getting adequate public transport so that people can commute without a car. We see this as increasing the Pakenham bus shuttle service, making sure all services are Myki accessible and making Koo Wee Rup part of Metro Zone 2, so a bus to Pakenham won't add anything to the cost of a train trip to town.
- Updating the clocktowers. Some of the history panels have never been filled and some need additional or revised information.
- Although not something Township can help with, we have our fingers crossed that the Bowls Club upgrade will happen this year.

Thank you to our Ward Councillor, Kaye Cameron, who has been such a positive advocate for our community and such a helpful resource for the committee.

Thank you to the Australia Day subcommittee and all who helped out on Australia Day, contributing to an important celebration of our local volunteers.

Thank you to Gavin Brock and Garry Oates for taking on the workload of Secretary and Vice President. Gavin unfailingly has the minutes ready to publish in each month's Blackfish and deals with the correspondence with calm efficiency. Garry has subbed as Chair at meetings and continues to encourage us to look at the committee in a different way, questioning our role and asking how we can reach out more to the community.

Thank you to Gus Moore and Garry Oates for their continued work on trying to improve the town's Christmas decorations.

Massive thank you to Bev Edwards for her work setting up the Christmas displays at the RSL, Light's garage, Stockdale & Leggo and in the old Wattle Theatre window and to those who helped her. Thanks also to the KWR Tinsel Terror Elf(Elves) who add a bit of Christmas sparkle to the town.

To the members of the Township Committee and to others who come along to our meetings; thank you for your support, your interest in the welfare of our community and your regular attendance throughout the year. Caroline Roff

Smoke Alarm Installation Program

CFA now has a free Smoke Alarm Installation Program happening where suitably trained volunteers will come to your house, do a survey on what smoke alarms you currently have installed, give you a few tips and information on the care of your alarms and then, if needed install new alarms.

As all alarms have a 10-year service life, all alarms should be replaced if they are more than 10-years old, batteries should be replaced regularly and they should be tested monthly.

The new smoke alarms installed by CFA have a lithium 10-year battery in them so they don't need changing but the whole alarm should be replaced after 10 years.

The latest info from the Community Advisory Committee

The August '23 meeting of the Community Advisory Committee (CAC) was held on August the 16th and was extremely successful in that many subjects were discussed, and decisions were taken on a problem or three brought to the meeting by members for a conclusion. After a welcome by the chairperson Geoff Stokes, and the confirmation of the previous minutes, Aileen Thoms reiterated the successful representation that Koo Wee Rup Regional Health Service (KRHS) made at the partnering in Healthcare Outcomes Summit that KRHS participated in, through involvement in the planning and then as 1 of 8 presenters at the summit. Tina Kendall was the presenter for KRHS.



Other items discussed and debated were: the new official terms of reference for the CAC and the recent very successful government accreditation of the KRHS hospital system. The accreditation was a very pleasing result bearing in mind that the accreditors made a complete surprise visit to the hospital. - no previous notification of a visit date had been given. The new strategic plan for the CAC and the stated priorities came next and included updated reports and recommendations for resident's experiences whilst under care. Noni Bourke, our CEO, then gave feedback on the GSCGC report especially the area of ensuring patients do not get the wrong medicines given to them.

The next meeting of the Community Advisory Committee (CAC) will be held on Tuesday the 21st of November 2023. But, in the meantime, any of our members will be available to you if you want to communicate with the Koo-Wee-Rup Regional Health Service (KRHS) Board of Management about problems that could be upsetting you, as a patient, a resident or a carer, and also, maybe, as an individual Koo-Wee-Rup resident or, indeed, from the whole community's point of view. The Community Advisory Committee members will listen closely to you and acknowledge your concerns, so that any problem you may have is understood and seriously considered.

If you as a consumer/customer, have a suggestion or some nagging thoughts about your difficulties, or your dependant's comforts or problems with any aspect of the KHRS, then get in touch with the KHRS CAC. Anyone with changing spots, or spots that look very different to others on their body, should have them assessed by an accredited skin cancer doctor as soon as possible.

Even if you are unsure if your spots have changed, it's worth having a doctor check your skin to ensure nothing is amiss. If you have a history of sunburn, multiple spots, previous skin cancer, or a family history of melanoma, you are at risk of skin cancer. The same is true if your family has light-coloured skin, even if you yourself have darker skin.

Remember that the damage may have been done when you were young, so just because you don't get sunburnt any more doesn't mean you're safe from skin cancer.

Early detection and treatment is essential

Melanoma is the third most common cancer in Australia, and more people are being diagnosed with skin cancer every year.

The good news is that, if detected early, there is approximately a 99% chance of survival as the melanoma can be confined to the skin. Delayed diagnosis, however, may result in the melanoma spreading to other parts of the body. Once this occurs, it becomes a highly aggressive cancer which makes it difficult to treat.

Unfortunately, melanomas don't present symptoms so the only way to find them is to examine your skin.

A full-body skin check by an accredited skin cancer doctor is the best aid in early diagnosis.

A Tale of Steam and Cornwall by Geoff Stokes

My regular readers will recall that my recent stories in 'Blackfish' have been about my memories of my early childhood and my business ventures in my adventurous life over the past years. This month I am going to be different and write about Cornwall in Southwest England and my historical research about engineering in this county and, yes, also 'steam', and I hope all this will interest you to read on to the end.

It all starts with my lifelong interest in steam. My own working life started in 1948 as a raw indentured apprentice with a company called John Thompson Water Tube Boilers who designed and installed power station boilers, producing steam for the generation of electricity. At the end of my working life, I was running my own company, 'Geoff Stokes - Fluid Control Pty, Ltd,' (liquids, gas and steam) this over recent years until I retired. Coincidentally some of the drawings for the boilers and pipework at Hazelwood power station in Victoria were scribed by me when I was a rooky draughtsman before I became a fluid control engineer after graduating from Wolverhampton Technical College in 1953 (Now Wolverhampton University) as a fluid control engineer. My enthusiasm into the world of steam engineering and its history led me to some interesting research, all centered around the county of Cornwall in the Southwest of England generally known as the best and most beautiful holiday area in the UK especially my own family's favourite holiday areas of St. Ives, Cape Cornwall, and Land's End where we holidayed almost every year.

My hobby of research led me to Sir Goldsworthy Gurney (1793–1875), an ingenious Cornish inventor who had picked up his enthusiasm for engineering from a chance meeting with Richard Trevithick a fellow Cornishman and pioneer of steam propulsion. In 1825, Gurney invented a steam carriage that could carry passengers. This wasn't entirely successful as people were reluctant to sit beside the unstable boiler, so Gurney subsequently designed a separate passenger carriage, and this became known as the 'Gurney Drag'. In 1829 the steam carriage travelled from London to Bath at an average speed of 15 mph (24 kph) – the first long journey by a self-propelled vehicle at a sustained speed anywhere in the World. Gurney also invented the World's first practical road engine, but he was before his time. The government-imposed taxes on steam-driven vehicles to protect the owners of horse-drawn carriages, and he went bankrupt! The high-speed trains made possible by Gurney's steam engines, and the resulting need for timetables, made necessary the creation of a uniform time, covering the whole of Britain. It was decided to set a standard time from Greenwich and so Greenwich Mean Time, or GMT came into being, another of Gurney's legacies. Gurney also invented 'Limelight' by forcing a mixture of oxygen and hydrogen through a blowpipe to produce a hot flame and then adding lime to create a bright light. He lit the whole of Bude Castle with one light using a series of mirrors to reflect the beams into different rooms. This was known as the 'Bude Light' and Gurney went on to light the Houses of Parliament using three light sources and an arrangement of prismatic mirrors, saving the cost of thousands of candles in the process. He also put it to use in lighthouses, where the single source was placed on a revolving platform to provide a flashing beam. In addition, the light was used in theatres to light the stage, as it was safer and brighter than traditional gas lighting, hence the phrase to be 'in the limelight' or 'centre stage'.

The first house in the world to be lit by gas is also in Cornwall at Redruth. William Murdock (1754–1839) was an engineer working for Boulton and Watt, who made steam engines in Birmingham. Many of them were used in the Cornish tin and copper mining industry and Murdock came to live in Redruth in 1782, as a local manger for the company. He had a brilliant mind and was often years ahead of others in his ideas. In 1794, he built a closed coal fire in his garden and ran a pipe from it into the house, where he lit the gas coming through from the burning coal – the world's first gas lighting system. In 1784, Murdock devised a method of using steam pressure to drive a piston inside a cylinder and he used this to drive a small model carriage for over 2 miles (3.2 km). He also invented, albeit on a small scale, a locomotive, 20 years before Richard Trevithick's full-scale version. It is still possible to follow the route he took, late at night, from his house in Cross Street past Redruth church, where the terrified vicar thought the hissing, fiery apparition was the Devil! Unfortunately, Murdock failed to persuade his employers of the potential for this invention and turned his talents elsewhere, leaving Trevithick to take the accolades as inventor of the steam engine. Murdock House, as it is now called, stands in Cross Street, Redruth, and is marked with a plaque.

Richard Trevithick, (b. April 13th, 1771, Illogan, Cornwall, England – died April 22nd, 1833, Dartford, Kent), British mechanical engineer and inventor who successfully harnessed high pressure steam and constructed the world's first steam railway locomotive (1803). In 1805 he adapted his high-pressure engine to driving an iron-rolling mill and to propelling a barge with the aid of paddle wheels. Trevithick spent his youth at Illogan in the tin-mining district of Cornwall and attended the village school. The schoolmaster described him as "disobedient, slow and obstinate." His father, a mine manager, considered him a loafer, and throughout his career Trevithick remained scarcely literate. Early in life, however, he displayed an extraordinary talent in engineering. Because of his intuitive ability to solve problems that perplexed educated engineers, he obtained his first job as engineer to several Cornish tin ore mines in 1790 at the age of 19. In 1797 he married Jane Harvey of a prominent engineering family. She bore him six children, one of whom, Francis, became locomotive superintendent of the London & Northwestern Railway and later wrote a biography of his father.

Because Cornwall has no coalfields, high import costs obliged the ore-mine operators to exercise rigid economy in the consumption of fuel for pumping and hoisting. Cornish engineers, therefore, found it imperative to improve the efficiency of the steam engine. The massive engine then in use was the low-pressure type invented by James Watt. Inventive but cautious, Watt thought that "strong steam" was too dangerous to harness; Trevithick thought differently. He soon realized that, by using high-pressure steam and allowing it to expand within the cylinder, a much smaller and lighter engine could be built without any less power than in the low-pressure type.

In 1797 Trevithick constructed high-pressure working models of both stationary and locomotive engines that were so successful that he built a full-scale, high-pressure engine for hoisting ore. In all,

he built 30 such engines; they were so compact that they could be transported in an ordinary farm wagon to the Cornish mines, where they were known as "puffer whims" because they vented their steam into the atmosphere.

Trevithick built his first steam carriage, which he drove up a hill in Camborne, Cornwall, on Christmas Eve 1801. The following March, with his cousin Andrew Vivian, he took out his historic patent for high-pressure engines for stationary and locomotive use. In 1803 he built a second carriage, which he drove through the streets of London, and constructed the world's first steam railway locomotive at Samuel Homfray's Penydaren Ironworks in South Wales. On February 21, 1804, that engine won a wager for Homfray by hauling a load of 10 tons of iron and 70 men along 10 miles of tramway. A

second, similar locomotive was built at Gateshead in 1805, and in 1808 Trevithick demonstrated a third, the *Catch-me-who-can*, on a circular track laid near Euston Road in London. He then abandoned these projects, because the cast-iron rails proved too brittle for the weight of his engines. In 1805 Trevithick adapted his high-pressure engine to driving an iron-rolling mill and propelling a barge with the aid of paddle wheels. His engine also powered the world's first steam dredgers (1806) and drove a threshing machine on a farm (1812). Such engines could not have succeeded without the improvements Trevithick made in the design and construction of boilers. For his small engines, he built a boiler and engine as a single unit, but he also designed a large wrought-iron boiler with a single internal flue, which became known throughout the world as the Cornish type. It was used in conjunction with the equally famous Cornish pumping engine,

which Trevithick perfected with the aid of local engineers. The latter was twice as economic as the Watt type, which it rapidly replaced. Trevithick, a quick-tempered and impulsive man, was entirely lacking in business sense. An untrustworthy partner caused the failure of a London business he started in 1808 for the manufacture of a type of iron tank Trevithick had patented; bankruptcy followed in 1811. Three years later, nine of Trevithick's engines were ordered for the Peruvian silver mines, and, dreaming of unlimited mineral wealth in the Andes Mountains, he sailed to South America in 1816. After many adventures, he returned to England in 1827, penniless, to find that in his absence other engineers, notably George Stephenson, had profited from his inventions. He died in poverty and was buried in an unmarked grave.

From my research into the subject, I hope you liked your few minutes of time back into the 18th and 19th centuries.

Tickets to be sold for \$2 each for a \$500 grocery voucher. 50% of the profits will be going to Lions Cord Blood.



When paramedics are called, a typical scenario is that distraught family members may be unable to give correct details of the patient's





condition or the medication they may be on. The paramedics physically have to collect all the patient's medication in the house, try and obtain a medical history and take it to the hospital with the patient.

This small book, which should be attached to the front of the refrigerator, contains patient contacts, service or carer provider information, medications and any medical condition, so a paramedic is able to treat and ready a patient for transport to hospital.





Act on penalty reminder notice or risk enforcement action

Victorians who have an outstanding fine for failing to vote in the 2022 State election are urged to act before the matter is referred to Fines Victoria.

Victorians who failed to vote in the November 2022 State election will start receiving a penalty reminder notice this week, which carries a fee of \$27.70 in addition to the original \$92 fine.

Electoral Commissioner, Sven Bluemmel, advised recipients of a penalty reminder notice to act as soon as possible.

'If you receive a penalty reminder notice in the mail, you have 3 options: pay the fine, request an internal review, or elect to go to court,' Mr Bluemmel said.

'Please get in touch with us as once we hand it over to Fines Victoria for enforcement action it's out of our hands.'

Non-voters have 28 days to respond to the penalty reminder notice. The Victorian Electoral Commission encourages people who are unsure what to do, or who require assistance throughout any stage of the infringements process, to call 1300 551 575 or visit vec.vic.gov.au/voting/fines-and-reviews

Community input will inform if there is interest for the proposed installation of a horse sculpture at Dick Jones Reserve, Lang Lang in homage to Lang Lang's rodeo history.

The proposed artwork aims to nurture a sense of community and shared history whilst also being a destination piece to encourage visitors to spend time in the town and contribute to Lang Lang's economy.

Cardinia Shire Council is hosting a pop event Friday 18 August from 11am-12pm at Dick Jones Reserve to answer questions and gather feedback.

Council previously engaged with the community in 2020, receiving positive feedback in support of public artwork in Lang Lang. This feedback was used to decide details of the artwork including the location and reference to Lang Lang's rodeo history.

The artwork was postponed due to some challenges including COVID-19, and the passing of Councillor Ray Brown who was a strong advocate for the project. Now with the opportunity to deliver the project, council would like to re-explore the community's interest for the artwork.



Bayles - What might have been (from previous page)

There were schemes at one time for Bayles to have both a High School and a Hotel – sadly, neither eventuated. It would be interesting to know if either had been built how it would have affected the development of the town as well as that of Koo Wee Rup, as almost certainly the Koo Wee Rup High School would not have been built, if the one at Bayles was. However, we will never know.

As we can see from the articles below; the Bayles community was in favour of a High School, but not a Hotel. Until 1957, when Koo Wee Rup High opened, children from Bayles, Yallock and Koo Wee Rup would have attended Dandenong High. If you lived on the east side of the Cora Lynn, you would have attended Warragul High.

The first report of the movement to establish a High School in Bayles was in August 1926 -

A public meeting was held at Cora Lynn when representatives were present from all parts of the Kooweerup swamp area, from Lang Lang and Yannathan to Narnargoon. Cr. P. Walsh, of Berwick shire, presided. The meeting was organised by the Iona women's section V.F.U., who have for some months been engaged in a movement to establish a high school in the swamp. A motion in favor of this was carried. Mr. Wrigley, assistant chief inspector of secondary schools, delivered an instructive address on the establishing of high schools. He said the department existed for the education of the children, but parents must take advantage of it. A site of eight acres was necessary for a H.E. [Higher Elementary] school and 10 acres for a high school, to be vested in the Minister. The local cash contribution varied from £1000 for a H.E. school to £10,000 for a high school. A committee was appointed representing 22 school centres, Cr. McCulloch and Cr. Dowd to represent Cranbourne and Berwick shires respectively. (The Age, August 28, 1926)

The Age reported again the next month -

At a meeting of district representatives at Cora Lynn the high school proposal was further considered. Sites at Cora Lynn and Bayles were reviewed, and it was unanimously decided to recommend an area of Crown land at Bayles, which is above flood level and large enough for all requirements. It was resolved to ask the Education department for an early inspection of the site. An active canvass for subscriptions and guarantees from parents is to be undertaken. Mrs. Shreeves was elected president, and Mrs. Terrill secretary. (The Age, September 17, 1926)



Bayles - What might have been (from previous page)

Another meeting was held in February 1927 -

At meeting of delegates held at Cora Lynn from the various centres of the swamp settlement it was decided that a site at Bayles be selected for the proposed higher elementary school. It will probably be some time before the school becomes an established fact. The Education department is to be asked to allow a temporary school to be held in the hall at Cora Lynn. (The Argus, February 19, 1927). Another report of this meeting noted that - Crs. McCulloch (president of Cranbourne Shire Council), Dowd (president of Berwick Shire Council), Bennett and Sage (Cranbourne Shire) have been appointed a deputation to request the Minister for Education to establish a higher elementary school at Bayles. (South Bourke & Mornington Journal, February 24, 1927)

Two years later, on June 1,1929, *The Argus* reported that - *The Education department has decided to establish a temporary elementary high school at Cora Lynn if sufficient inducement offers. A permanent site has been chosen at Bayles.* Clearly, nothing happened, as there was never a secondary school built at either Bayles or Cora Lynn.

The article about the Bayles Hotel comes from *The Argus* of February 11, 1931.

Application was made to the Licensing Court yesterday by Mr Luke Murphy on behalf of Edward Parnell Buckley for the issue of a victualler's licence at Bayles, a township in the Koo-Wee-Rup district. The Court consisted of Messrs R. Barr (chairman), J. Lock and V. Tanner. Mr Gamble (instructed by Messrs W.B. and O. McCutcheon) opposed the application on behalf of certain residents and ratepayers of the neighbourhood, and Mr. L.J. Murphy opposed on behalf of other residents of the district. Mr. Gamble said that he had a petition opposing the issue, signed by a majority of the ratepayers within a radius of three miles.

Superintendent Ashton submitted a report, in which he said that he did not approve of the

issue of the licence. The site was away from the main road, and there were other hotels four miles and a half distant. There were fewer than 100 residents of the township of Bayles. Evidence on behalf of those opposing the application was that there were only 271 adult residents in the area served by the proposed hotel, and that there were only three mixed trains a week to the Bayles railway station.




Main Street, Bayles c. 1930s, from the Bayles Fauna Park collection

Mr Luke Murphy and that it was proposed to erect an hotel costing £3,500. There were 3,000 to 4,000 acres under potatoes in the area, and many sportsmen visited the district in the quail season. The chairman said that the amount of trade at the proposed hotel would apparently be microscopical. There had never been a time at which the Court had to be more careful not to encourage purely speculative ventures. Mr Tanner said that no evidence had been submitted to show that a hotel was required. Mr. Luke Murphy withdrew the application.

So that was the end of a Hotel for Bayles.

Edward Parnell Buckley, the man who applied for the Hotel licence, was born in 1889 in Balnarring to John and Catherine Buckley. He was the second youngest of their eleven children - his siblings were David, Elizabeth, Nellie, Mary, Michael, Patrick, John, Thomas, Catherine and Annie, who were born between 1867 to 1892 at Balnarring. His mother, Catherine, was the daughter of John Dore, of *Mt Ararat*, Nar Nar Goon. John Dore and Michael Hennessey had taken up the Mt Ararat run of 1,900 acres in 1844. Edward was listed in the 1914 to 1931 Electoral Rolls as a farmer at Balnarring. He died on October 20, 1932, aged only 42 and is buried at the Crib Point Cemetery. It would be interesting to know why he applied for a victualler's licence at Bayles in 1931, after many years of farming at Balnarring.
