Although it was a bit chilly, fortunately the rain held off long enough for everybody to enjoy the





Councillor Cameron was unable to attend this month, however a range of issues were raised at the meeting to be forwarded to our councillor for follow up.

- Trees have been cut down along the Rail Trail but have been left in situ, they are now dying and still not been cleared up.
- Can Koo Wee Rup be added to the street tree renewal program
- The plan for the new subdivision on Rossiter Road near the Health service was discussed. The proposal is currently
  awaiting approval from the federal government because of the impact on endangered species found on the site
  (Southern Brown Bandicoot and Growling Grass Frog). Once this has been granted the application will then be
  submitted for planning approval. The issue of one access point, especially for emergency services was raised. There
  was also discussion regarding flood levels.

#### Power Issues:

The state government has been promoting community based local grids, it would be good to find out more about these and if Koo Wee Rup can be considered.


Koo Wee Rup has suffered several outages this year including two in one day on Easter Monday. There has been no contact as to the cause of the outages. The outage tracker is also not updated during these events, so residents are unable to see what is going on or make arrangements to get through the power outage.



# Batteries and e-waste do not belong in the bin

Residents are being urged to keep their community safe by not putting batteries or e-waste in their household bins.

E-waste is any item with a battery, cord or plug at the end of its useful life. This includes household batteries, battery-operated toys, vapes and e-cigarettes, devices, and appliances.

There has been an alarming increase in waste and recycling truck fires. In 2022, Cardinia Shire didn't have a single fire in its waste and recycling trucks. This increased to 4 truck fires in 2023. In just the first few months of this year, there have been 3 truck fires and one recycling facility fire. These fires are extremely dangerous and put truck drivers, staff and the community at risk, as well as taking valuable resources from the fire authorities to put them out. The fires are usually caused by batteries and e-waste being put in household bins.

E-waste has been banned from Victorian landfill since 2019, which means it cannot go in any household bins.

Residents can correctly dispose of their e-waste for free by:

- Booking a hard waste collection
- Taking small household items such as batteries, laptops and mobile phones to any Council drop-off locations, major supermarkets, or Officeworks. For drop-off locations, go to <a href="https://www.cardinia.vic.gov.au/ewaste">www.cardinia.vic.gov.au/ewaste</a>

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### **Our days in Music Hall**

### at the Victoria Theatre, Sovereign Hill, Ballarat 1977

It was in the September 2021 issue of 'Blackfish that I wrote a story called "Tales from my singing years". It was about my time in the UK when I had singing roles in Grand Opera such as the High Priest in Verdie's Nabucco, and Escamillo the Bull Fighter in the opera Carmen by Georges Bizet and many other productions. I also made a brief mention of the shows I was involved in after we came to Australia in 1970.

It was whilst we were in the UK that my dear wife Olive became deeply involved with the theatre and had many character roles in plays such as 'Pride and Prejudice" and "The Ring of Truth. In the early seventies here in Australia, Olive and I joined the Doncaster and Templestowe Dramatic Society, and a while later Olive became a regular actor with them and eventually became the President of the group. Olive mentioned to someone on the committee that I had also done some producing and directing as well as singing and acting. I say this because I can remember being asked about the sort of show I would like to put on for them. I had this thought that I would like to produce and direct an 'Old Time Music Hall' along the lines of that style of British entertainment then currently showing on the television from the BBC. However, mine would be authentic; that is, using actual programs from the original Music Halls of the 1890s and, where possible reproducing them. Some of the comedy wouldn't work, I admitted that, but some other aspects of this style of entertainment, not now performed in modern times, certainly would. It wasn't long after that I received the go-ahead from the committee.

I did a lot of research and picked out all sorts of authentic original varietal acts that we could do including songs and dances, an illusionist/escape artist act, opera arias and duets, musical skits etc, and of cause a traditional melodrama called 'Foiled and Counter Foiled'. We had to hold extensive auditions because the event attracted a lot of would-be

All the elements of an old-fashioned English music hall were at the Templestowe Memorial Hall; last week.

Nowadays, modern theatre talks about audience participation, but the full house at the Doncaster-Templestowe Repertory Group's "The Good Old Days" needed no prompting

They sang along, booed, hissed, cheered, comment-ed in the right places and made the appropriate

ed in the right places and made the appropriate oobs and as at the chairman's vociferous introduction of each item. The group's intention was to take its audience back to a typical evening's entertainment in a London metropolitan hall at the turn of the century and they did just that. The costuming, the di-

The costuming, the di-rection and presentation was excellent and Geoff was excellent and Geoff Stokes, who devised and directed the production, has talents worthy of big-ger things.

Solo items were superb

and the show just flowed, with no shyness on the part of the audience when it came to joining in the choruses.

A major highlight was the showing of one of the first silent movie west-erns, "The Great Train Robbery." With Patricia Trevellian providing the accompani

providing the accompaniment on the piano and Gavin Dimmick on drums, the movie was a winner in every way and drew a greater audience response than any modern movie I have seen. The main

The main regret was the show has now finished

It would be a winner as It would be a winner as a regular runner in the area and would no doubt draw large audiences from all over Melbourne once the word got out.

A great idea was the BYO licence and the audience bringing along their own supper, which made the Memorial Hall like one big banny night time.

one big happy night time picnic.—Jane Eyre.

performers from far and wide and, in doing so, we met people who became close friends. The dates of the Old Time Music Hall performances were set for the 30th and the 31st of October and the 1st, 6th, 7th, and 8th of November 1975. Opening night was quite a night! We had tables and chairs in the body of the hall organised for people to bring their own food and drinks and an alcohol licence was obtained for all the nights of the performance. To give a traditional Music Hall effect we had large spotlights at the rear of the hall, manually operated. Our comedian 'waiters' mingled among the audience, an audience

who were well primed to ad lib with the chairman (me) during the show, especially the melodrama. This was before modern drink driving laws were introduced so right from the start there was considerable tippling and bonhomie! We received rave reviews, and the show was a huge success; it was something new to the semi amateur stage, a true reenactment that scored with the audience and was a joy to perform by the singers and the actors. One of the highlights was the 'sawing in half' of one of our ladies by our own magician. Another, of course, was the melodrama with the audience hissing the villain and cheering the hero and sighing for our maiden in distress.

We had full houses at every show and both of our children were involved, helping with aiming the spotlights on to the stage, odd jobs etc. Olive was the ticket and seating boss and assisted with decor and backstage too. We had a huge job clearing up after the shows, especially the Saturdays. We had a truck full of bottles and these were taken to the bottle tip, organised by the local Scout leader. The scouts received a big bonus from the Bottle-O for all the extra bottles they collected during our performances.

After this first Music Hall the production of plays by the Society proceeded as normal but to improve their cash flow quickly it was suggested that the Group put on another Music Hall. And so, we did, with the same format as before and the opening night to be the 14th of July 1977. I won't repeat details of all the things that went on, the auditions, rehearsals, lighting etc, because apart from some new faces and acts the story would be the same as before. However, it was in some ways very different to the first show, and it was certainly better. The experiences of 1975 were noted, and, in this show, there was a new vigour and professionalism, obvious to me when the rehearsals started. This time we did nine shows with the last night being on the 30th of July. Continued next page

I am not sure whether it was this Saturday or the one before, but at one of these performances there was a lady in the audience who came and had a chat with us after curtain call. She was a management executive from the Sovereign Hill Historic Township and Gold Mine re-creation at Ballarat. Sovereign Hill was, and still is, a very large complex, a re-build of the original town and the gold workings in the area all painstakingly recreated. As well as streets, shops, houses, blacksmith, Chinese temple, church etc, it has a wonderful old-time theatre called the Victoria Theatre. The lady asked us if we would put on our show at this very theatre in Ballarat. We said yes straight away of course, and we could hardly believe that we were being asked to 'play away' so to speak, at such a prestigious and grand place. Questions were asked about how we would get the sets and props there, some 120km away, could all the cast make it on these dates, where would we stay? What about the lighting and would the sets fit when we tried to set up on this huge stage compared with the one at the Templestowe Memorial Hall? For your interest, here is a short history of the original theatre reproduced from the program of our show.

### THE VICTORIA THEATRE

On the night of December 1st, 1855, the United States Hotel, Main Road, was destroyed by fire. However, it rose again from the ashes together with an attached Concert Hall, the Victoria Theatre. The timber from which it was constructed had been growing in the forest some 15 days earlier.

The Victoria Theatre opened on 16th February 1856 with a season by the legendary Lola Montez. She performed several farces and her famous spider dance, delighted the diggers and enraged the sensibilities of the respectable people of the town.

The new theatre was claimed to be the largest in the colony outside Melbourne. It consisted of two storeys with circular boxes and a pigeon gallery - (rows of boxes shaped like pigeonholes). From the dress circle direct access was available to the upstairs bar of the hotel where refreshments were dispensed. The whole is described as opulently decorated and lighted by magnificent chandeliers. However, seating was only procurable in the boxes, and the pit patrons were accommodated in crowded, noisy, and smoky conditions.

Admission charges were in the order of half a crown for a seat upstairs and one shilling in the pit. For this considerable outlay patrons would be entertained by anything from the five acts of Romeo and Juliet to a lecture on phrenology by Mr. Hamilton illustrated by skulls, diagrams and examinations of the living heads of the notorieties and celebrities of Ballarat.

In December 1856 the "Ballarat Times" was full of praise: "To the

Well, we decided to get on with it and the dates of the 5, 6, and 12th of August 1977 were chosen. Friday and Saturday and the following Friday. Why we didn't play on the following Saturday escapes me now, possibly there may have been another event at the theatre or maybe one or two of our players couldn't make it. I arranged with the transport department of the Company I was working for at the time to let us borrow a truck and for me to drive it. The charge for this by the foreman was a slab of beer! Can you imagine that happening today!? We had a couple of days off work to build the sets and set up the lighting and dear Olive had to find accommodation for over 30 people. She did this with booking motels and caravans in the local caravan park.

We were ready on time despite the frost and the snow which fell and, in short, we all had a super experience playing to full houses. As before the stalls were laid out with tables for supper and the dress circle was filled with eminent persons from the area; at one performance I do recall seeing Bill Lawry, the Australian cricket captain of the time, looking down on us as was the Premier of Victoria, Dick Hamer, one other evening. We were minor celebrities for a while and the local press gave us a good write up and critique. Olive and I and the children stayed in a caravan during the show and our children helped in many ways with the set up and operating the spot lamps. Lots of friendships were made and we enjoyed the hard work. Many who were in the audience asked us how on earth did we manage to cut our lovely lady in half!

As the director of the show, my notes on the program read: -

Welcome to our "BRITISH MUSIC HALL REMINISCENCE 1890 - 1910".

To reminisce is to recall the past and that is just what we are going to do tonight. Come with us for just a short time to the Golden Era of Music Hall; an age of Patriotism, Empire, despair for some, riches beyond imagination for others — To a Metropolitan Hall where the performers play out the life of the times. Their art is the art of living, and you will see comedy, pathos and the drama of these years played out before your very eyes in the songs and acts that they perform. Not for us the modern review in old time dress; everything you see and hear tonight is authentic material of the day. Sit back and relax; enjoy yourselves – let us show you how it really was. Thank you for joining us.

Just a mention here that the show was based upon my research from the 'London Illustrated News', 'British Music Hall'

by Mander Michenson, 'Victorian Song' by M, Wilson Disher, and 'The British Music Hall' by Peter Davidson.

Here is a look at the start of the script for the Chairman (me) of the Music Hall; at the commencement August 1977 of The Good Old Days Music Hall at the Victoria Theatre, Sovereign Hill, Ballarat: -

### DRUM ROLL

"My Lords, Ladies, and Gentlemen, Good Evening.

We present for your delectation tonight, a vociferous verification of their vocal versatility, vitality, vivacity, and verve - in short,

THE GOOD OLD DAYS MUSIC HALL." DRUM ROLL

Ad with lib latecomers etc.

"And to commence our evening together what better to start with than those lustrous, (DRUMROLL) luscious, (DRUMROLL) lovely, ladies of the chorus to sing for you,

TA RA RA BOOM DE AY" ... and so on and so on.

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
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### **News from the Community Advisory Committee**



### A short history of the town of Koo Wee Rup

### **Community Groups and Amenities**

A Cricket Club started in 1893, the Recreation Reserve opened in 1906, and a football team had started by 1907. The

Koo Wee Rup Public Hall opened in April 1902, a brick front was added in 1923/1924 and it was renamed as a Memorial Hall. It was demolished in 2002. The Royal Hotel was erected in 1915. The Koo Wee Rup Sun was first published in 1918, taking over from the Lang Lang Guardian which had commenced publication in 1902. The Masonic Lodge commenced in 1923. The Wattle Picture Theatre was opened in 1927, the same year the Koo Wee Rup Electric Light and Power Company began supplying limited electricity to the town. SEC power was switched on in the town in 1935. In 1929, the first Koo Wee Rup Scout Troop was formed. To add further to the amenity of the town in 1930 the water tower and the water supply system opened and in 1943 the Fire Brigade was formed.

### A short history of the town of Koo Wee Rup from previous page

### Churches

The Presbyterian Church is the oldest Church in the town. The building was originally the Wesleyan Church in Cranbourne and when it was no longer required, it was purchased by the Koo Wee Rup Presbyterians for 70 pounds. This church, designed by Architect Alfred Dunn, had been erected in 1888 and it was transported to Koo Wee Rup on a large trolley

drawn by 13 horses and placed on land donated by Christopher Moody. The first service in this building was on March 20, 1896. The first Catholic Church was built in 1902 and the current church was opened December 1962. The Anglican Church was built in 1917. It closed in 2012 and the congregation moved to the Uniting Church. The Methodist Church (now Uniting) was moved from Yallock to Rossiter Road in 1932. In 1978 this building was moved to a camp in Grantville and a wooden church from Narre Warren East was relocated to the site, it was given a brick veneer and a new hall added and opened on February 3, 1980.

### **Health**

A Bush Nursing Centre was opened in 1918. On May 23, 1923 the Fallen Soldiers' Memorial Hospital opened in Station Street; and the Westernport Memorial Hospital in Rossiter Road on December 4, 1955. The Hospital Ladies' Auxiliary was established in July 1955 – they are celebrating seventy years next year. In 1946, the Infant Welfare Centre was opened in a room at the Memorial Hall and in 1953 the Pre-School opened.

#### Schools

The first School was established in 1884 between Koo Wee Rup and Bayles (at Bethunes Road) with 22 pupils. It was known as the Yallock School, until 1903 when the name was changed to Koo Wee Rup. In 1910, the school moved to Rossiter Road (to the Secondary College location) and a new building was built in 1915. In 1953, the Higher Elementary School was completed. This School included both primary and secondary classes (Forms 1 to 3 or Years 7 to 9). The School became a High School in 1957 and shared the building with the primary school students until November 1960 when the Primary School opened in Moody Street. St John the Baptist Catholic School opened in 1936.

#### Railways

The Koo Wee Rup Railway station was opened on August 18, 1889. The Station was originally called Yallock and was renamed Koo Wee Rup in 1892. In 1922, Koo Wee Rup became a railway junction with the opening of the Strzelecki railway line. This line was closed in stages and the last stretch from Bayles to Koo Wee Rup closed in 1959. Passenger services to Koo Wee Rup ceased in June 1981 were reinstated December 1984 and ceased again in July 1993.

### Oldest buildings in town

The 1884 School building, which had moved from Bethunes Road to Rossiter Road, was shifted again in 1919 to become the Island Road School. The School closed in 1974 and ten years later the building moved back to the Primary School site in Moody Street.

However, the oldest building still on its original site is the house, "The Grange", off Sybella Avenue. This was built in 1887-88 for Andrew and Agnes Hudson, though sadly Andrew died just before they moved in. Agnes, nee Johnston, was firstly married to Alexander Mickle. Alexander and Agnes were the great grandparents of Local Historian, David Mickle.

The Koo Wee Rup Swamp Historical Society meets on the second Wednesday of each month at Mallow house in Rossiter Road, corner of Henry Street. The next meeting is on May 8 at 7.30pm. New members welcome. The Museum is generally open on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month; we will be open May 12 from 1.30pm, but closed on May 26 as it is our annual luncheon.
